Pupil Premium Statement

The purpose of this document is to inform Parents on how Pupil Premium is used at Saint Paul's Catholic High School. It includes confirmation of allocated funds, how the money is being spent and how it is helping to close the gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers.

Pupil Premium Allocation for Saint Paul's Catholic High School

The Government has allocated a specific Pupil Premium Grant to every school. The Pupil Premium grant provides financial support for pupils who:-

1. were registered as eligible for free school meals (FSM) in the last 6 years.
2. have been looked after for 1 day or more.
3. were adopted from care on or after 30th December 2005 or left care under a special guardianship order or child arrangement order

The belief that every child regardless of background, culture, social deprivation, or any other potential barrier should be given chance to succeed is at the heart of how we use the Pupil Premium grant at Saint Paul's.

Key principle for the Pupil Premium Grant

To narrow the disadvantage gap by addressing inequalities and raising the attainment of those pupils in low-income families.

What we expect to see:

2014/2015 Pupil premium strategy is based on the following objectives

1. Improving the attainment and achievements of pupils – Learning in the curriculum
2. Provide social and emotional support to improve student attendance and engagement
3. Enrichment beyond the community - Raise aspirations and enrichment beyond the curriculum
4. Families and the community
