
Our staff have been starting each month with a reflective prayer led by Father Owen in our school chapel.

We have been involved with #BeeWell, a new programme, co-created with young people, in which BeeWell are surveying the domains and drivers of wellbeing of pupils in secondary schools across Greater Manchester on an annual basis from autumn 2021, using the data generated to deliver positive change in our schools and communities as a result.

#BeeWell is a collaboration between the University of Manchester, the Greater Manchester Combined Authority, and the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families.

The annual #BeeWell survey is the first of its kind across a city-region and has heard from tens of thousands of young people.

This year (2022-23), pupils in Years 9 and 10 in secondary schools across Greater Manchester completed the #BeeWell survey. As part of the survey, they provided their residential postcode, which enabled BeeWell to map their aggregated data across the neighbourhoods of the city-region.

Forensic Science Week

Forensic Science Week

Forensic Science was the theme explored by students who recently took part in a Forensic Science Week, a celebration of science, engineering, maths and technology.

The children enjoyed an exciting, engaging and immersive range of activities that showcased how the Science they learn in school can have a powerful impact in the real world. One of the main objectives of the Year 7 Forensics week was to link some of the practical skills which the students had learned in their first term to the 'real world' and potential careers they could pursue.

The week started with the introduction of a 'crime scene' and progressed to the examination of forensic exhibits, evidence interpretation, and the presentation of evidence in a courtroom trial. The

Year 7 students had the opportunity to be Crime Scene Investigators during a week full of activities.

Implementing Biology, Chemistry and Physicsbased skills along with cooperation and impressive teamwork, the children became CSI style investigators who worked together to solve a particularly complex and heinous crime. There were also activities that focused on the diversity of knowledge, through to STEM careers and subjects.

The students were given a 'real' crime to investigate and evidence to analyse in order to present a case against the suspects. The scenario was that the suspects were caught speeding away from the bank, which had just been robbed. The students had to analyse fingerprints, ink and blood as evidence.

Miss Dewhurst, Lead Practioner of Science, said: "The week's programme aimed to inspire the next generation of scientists with fun and participative activities. The activities highlighted how science relates to our everyday lives. The pupils learnt about taking samples, fingerprints and DNA to use as evidence and also about the role of the forensic scientists and Crime Scene Investigators."



Miss Dewhurst added: "There were lots of exciting activities happening throughout our school. We are very keen to inspire and engage the students in the wonder and excitement of Science."

Mr McMahon, Head of Science, added: "The week's activities engaged and excited the children in science by constructing a mock crime scene investigation. This allowed the children to practise skills such as gathering evidence, interpreting data, taking measurements, teamwork and looking for trends and patterns. The activities were great fun and very popular with the students. The sessions helped the students see how Science can be applied in real life."

"Science is vital to the future of our country and involvement in projects such as this are a great way for us to encourage our students to enjoy the subjects and see them as both interesting and accessible," commented Mr Whiteside, Head Teacher. "We need to do everything we can to inspire the next generation."

People's History Museum

A Visit to the People's History Museum

A group of students from Saint Paul's visited the People's History Museum in Manchester as part of their GCSE History studies.

The People's History Museum in Manchester is the national museum of democracy. The museum aims to engage, inspire and inform diverse audiences by showing 'there have always been ideas worth fighting for'.

As part of the Year 11 History GCSE, the History department organised a visit for the students to the museum which covers the vast majority of a module of their GCSE (Power and the People). The students were able to expand their learning by exploring in much greater depth areas of the syllabus such as the Chartists and the Suffragettes.

Mr Welsby, Head of History, explained: "The Year 11 students are studying the abstract concept of power as part of their History GCSE and the People's

History Museum helped them to visualise this concept. The students attended live action shows, were able to handle and explore real life artefacts and see the many links with the local community."

"The students showed a great deal of interest and enthusiasm in the subject and their behaviour during the trip was exemplary. They were extremely engaged with the exhibits and talks it brought their learning to life!"

Mr Whiteside, Headteacher, added: "It was fantastic for the students to see their classroom learning coming to life as they explored the museum. Visits like these provide a very valuable

learning curriculum. This was a wonderful visit which provided masses of inspiration; the visit provided a unique

opportunity for our students to produce primary research to support their classwork."





STEM Club

STEM Club - Stimulating Minds at Saint Paul's!

The STEM Club at Saint Paul's has been designed to spark inspiration and to foster long-term interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. The Club gives the opportunity for Year 8 students to explore the wonders of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) in a stimulating and engaging environment.

The club has been designed to complement the national curriculum by demonstrating the link between the wider world and enhancing the students' understanding and aptitude for problem solving, creativity and engineering.

The first project, which involves reducing single use plastics and taking greater care of our planet, will focus on making and marketing shampoo bars:

Science – researching ingredients and formulating the perfect environmentally friendly 'recipe' through experimentation (practicals).

Technology - using CAD (computer aided design) to create a company logo and building a template for a silicone mould.

Maths - costing materials and using geometry packaging design.

Pupils will also learn about marketing and advertising campaigns

"The students attending the STEM Club are curious about science, technology, engineering and math and enjoy the hands-on approach we encourage," explained Miss Dewhurst, Lead Practioner of Science. 
Each production used minimal set and costume to place emphasis on language and performance rather than set and design.

Promoting a Love of Reading

The Library Monitors at Saint Paul's are students who help in the library at break and lunch times. They work with the librarian, Mrs Savova, to help the library run smoothly and efficiently and provide an opportunity for pupils to be active in decision making about what the library offers.

Organising students to help with the library not only ensures the smooth day-to-day running of the library, but also helps develop a sense of responsibility, achievement and self-esteem in the children

The role of Library Monitors provides leadership opportunities within the school, it encourages ownership of the library by students, improves the library environment following student input and provides the opportunity to learn new skills, including research and ICT skills.

When selecting Library monitors the school takes into consideration the student's willingness to take responsibility, their interest in promoting the library, being a team player, their willingness to give up some time at break and lunchtimes to help out in the library, being organised and accurate, their desire to make the library space a safe and enticing place for other students to use and providing friendly customer service.

Mrs Savova explained: "The monitors volunteer during break and/or lunch on a rota to help with tasks such as issuing/retuning/renewing books, shelving, collecting and giving out passes, promoting the library (putting posters around school or helping running activities), giving out reminders to forms, helping younger students with homework or troubleshooting issues with computers such as logging in, printing, etc.

They gain a valuable experience and are trained how to use the library management system and some of them go on work experience in public libraries (last year Alex went to Manchester Central Library and this year Minna and Kezia will be doing their work experience there.

Quite a few of them are doing or intend to do Duke of Edinburgh award and use the experience they gain in the library as part of their volunteering or skills section."

"Our Library Monitors do a wonderful job of helping our Librarian, carrying out varied jobs to keep our library looking wonderful," added Mr Sharrock, English Teacher and Literacy Coordinator. "They help other students and teachers in the library, assist to keep the library a wonderful place to visit, help build a love of reading, help organise activities for other students to participate in when visiting the library, assist the librarian to come up with new ideas and activities and promote the love of visiting the library."


