100% Attendance Reward Day



Saint Paul's rewarded students who achieved 100% attendance with a special reward day. These students received a special invite and enjoyed an extended break with a delicious hot chocolate.


Saint Paul's proudly welcomed back former students for our annual Certificate and Awards Presentation, celebrating their achievements and progress during the previous academic year.


Celebrating Geography Stars!

KEEP BACK FROM THE EDGE

Keep back from slippery banks.

Stick to well-lit areas and plan your walks in daylight or along well-lit paths.

Never go onto the ice.



KEEP CHILDREN AND DOGS WITHIN REACH

Teach children not to go onto ice.

Keep dogs on a lead near ice and slippery banks.

If out enjoying a winter walk, walk with friends.



Enjoy Water Safely



IF YOU'RE IN TROUBLE FLOAT AND CALL FOR HELP.

Stay calm, float on your back and call for help.

Wait for help and keep as still as possible.

Preserve heat by pressing your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the water.

Throw something that floats to somebody that has fallen in.



CALL 999

Do not enter cold water or ice to rescue.

Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach.

The Holocaust

The Holocaust Educational Trust Visits Saint Paul's

Year 10 History students took part in a Virtual Reality workshop provided by the Holocaust Educational Trust. The programme combined survivor testimony with virtual tours of Nazi concentration camps, offering an unforgettable learning experience aligned with the GCSE curriculum on Nazi persecution (1933-1945).

Mr Welsby, Head of History, explained: "The workshop was delivered by expert educators providing an unforgettable learning experience for our GCSE History students. They were able to interact with a Holocaust survivor and take a virtual tour of a Nazi Concentration camp.

The workshop was an invaluable learning experience for our students. It not only met the requirements of the National Curriculum but it also helped our pupils develop their knowledge and understanding of Nazi persecution."

Students learned the story of Holocaust survivor Manfred Goldberg BEM, born in Kassel, Germany in 1930. After escalating persecution, he was deported to the Riga Ghetto in 1941, later sent to labour camps and Stutthof concentration camp. He endured brutal conditions and a death march before liberation in May 1945. Manfred moved to Britain in 1946, rebuilt his life, and graduated from London University.

Forensic Science Week

Forensic Science Week Inspires Future Investigators at Saint Paul's

Saint Paul's hosted an exciting Forensic Science Week, immersing Year 7 students in the fascinating world of crime scene investigation. The event celebrated science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) through hands-on activities that demonstrated how classroom learning connects to real-world careers.

The week began with the creation of a realistic crime scene and progressed to the analysis of forensic exhibits, interpretation of evidence, and even a mock courtroom trial. Students stepped into the role of Crime Scene Investigators, applying biology, chemistry, and physics skills to solve a complex case. Working collaboratively, they examined fingerprints, ink samples, and blood evidence to build a case against suspects in a simulated bank robbery.

Ms. Passley-Biggins, Science Teacher, explained:

"Our goal was to spark curiosity and show students how science shapes everyday life. They learned how to collect samples, analyse fingerprints and DNA, and understand the critical role forensic scientists play in solving crimes. It was science in action—fun, challenging, and rewarding."



Mr. McMahon, Head of Science, added:

The week's programme not only showcased the diversity of scientific knowledge but also highlighted the importance of collaboration and critical thinking. By connecting classroom learning to real-world applications, Saint Paul's is helping to nurture the next generation of scientists and innovators.



Geography Field Trip



Exploring Urban Contrasts: Geography Field Trip

Students from Saint Paul's embarked on an insightful Geography field trip, visiting contrasting areas of Manchester as part of their GCSE coursework. The Year 10 students worked in small groups to investigate how quality of life varies across different urban environments. The students travelled on the tram, supported by the Bee Network who gave them a discount. The students were investigating how the city changes as you travel through it....

The trip was designed to bring classroom learning to life, allowing students to apply their theoretical knowledge in a real-world context. Over the course of the day, they visited five distinct sites across Manchester, conducting a range of activities including environmental surveys, land-use mapping, and public questionnaires.

Mrs Vallely, Head of Geography, praised the students' engagement and enthusiasm:

"The students had a fantastic day and really enjoyed the experience. Fieldwork is a vital part of geography education, and this trip directly connected to the topics we've been exploring in class. I was delighted to see how confidently they applied their classroom learning to real-world situations."

She added:

"This was an urban fieldwork trip focused on investigating how the quality of life varies within a city. The students showed a very positive attitude throughout and were genuinely curious about their findings."

Mrs Chisnall, Geography Teacher, highlighted the students' resilience and teamwork:

"The classes visited five different sites and completed four activities at each, including conducting questionnaires with members of the public. Many students were initially nervous about approaching strangers, but they quickly overcame their fears. Even when faced with setbacks, they persevered—and I was incredibly proud of their determination."

Mr Whiteside, Head Teacher, emphasised the broader value of fieldwork:

"A field trip offers a level of understanding that no textbook or classroom lesson can fully replicate. It encourages creativity, critical thinking, and gives students a sense of ownership over their learning. It's a brilliant way to make Geography come alive."

The field trip not only supported academic development but also helped students build confidence, communication skills, and a deeper appreciation for the complexities of urban life.

21st Nov. '25 I taught at the newly opened St. Paul's in 1955. It was my first appointment after my qualification. I was the science teacher for 15 years. I retired as a Deputy Headteacher at Cardinal Newman High School for girls after reorganisation due to falling numbers.

I suggested to the new governors that it'd be good idea to call the new school St. Paul's back to the beginning... and it was adopted.

I became acting head the end of my career, due to my health problems. Why am I telling you this? Because St. Paul's is in the marrow of my bones.

I am now 93 and not quite as sprightly as I was in 1955!

Wellbeing Ambassadors


Wellbeing Ambassadors: Supporting Our School Community




